

### **Electric & Water Bills** Combining in July

LELWD electric and water customers will receive one monthly bill that includes both services starting in July. Customers will be able to make one payment to cover both services.

Also, water customers will now be billed monthly instead of quarterly. The \$20 quarterly use fee will be \$7 monthly.

The new bills will include a record of the electric and water meter readings, usage history and billing details. Customers with questions or who continue to receive separate bills should call 978-540-2222.


#### **Open Space Survey**

#### Sewer Line Construction Starts This Summer

Installation of sewer and water mains as part of the expanded Littleton Common Sewer System kicks off this summer. The work will require digging in the roadway, but every effort will be made to reduce the impact on drivers and residents.

On June 1, LELWD hosted a preconstruction meeting with the contractor, engineering firm, state officials and town departments, including fire, police, public works, and schools. Work on residential streets will be done in the daytime and work on state roads will primarily occur at night.



The project will impact King, Russell, Shattuck and Steven streets and Great and Meetinghouse roads. The sewer collection system is expected to be completed by November 2024. Updates on the sewer project are available at lelwd.com.
